

A WEEK IN THE LIFE OF AN INTERNATIONAL SECURITY STUDIES STUDENT




RENT

Students in the Czech Republic generally live in one of two types of accommodation: university accommodation or private accommodation. University accommodation will allow you to settle into student life more easily. On the other hand, renting a private flat may appeal to those who want a little more privacy.

After a student enters university the price of accommodation will be around 4500 CZK per month. A One-bedroom apartment on the other hand, in the city centre, costs around 12 000 CZK per month. Many students decide to share flats. In that case, the rental costs are almost equal to the price that students pay for living in a dormitory, moreover, each person has his or her own room.

In the Czech Republic, it is easy to find quality food at an affordable price. On average, students can expect to pay the following:

CULTURE




Prague is a city located in the very heart of Europe. What comes with this is a complex history and cultural development that has spanned hundreds of years.

CAREER OPPORTUNITIES

Being a master's student of International Security Studies programmes (MISS) in Charles University (Prague) has been an incredible opportunity to learn more about the field of my passion and stay in one of the most beautiful cities in Europe! The study programme is created by lecturers with expertise in their field, who have a clear idea of the learning outcomes in mind, so that the chosen courses give you both the foundational understanding and introduce you to the newest developments and challenges of the field. You can take courses ranging from theoretical ones, such as the Traditional and Critical Concepts in Security Studies (going through the evolution of the discipline), to practical ones, such as Crisis Games (aiming to give a direct experience in international crisis bargaining), which helps to gain knowledge and develop a range of skills needed in the professional life. Regarding my professional career, I landed an internship at the Organization of American States, a couple months after graduating, but now I am looking for a more permanent job. While studying there I discovered how many things are actually connected to security and now I am highly interested in the fight against corruption and impunity...I think that overall my experience was great, and that the acquired knowledge can be implemented in many fields of international affairs. I am glad I did this program because it also allowed me to get closer to the career path I want to be in.

The security studies program at Charles University has positively changed the entire trajectory of my life. Through its dual degree program, it has provided me with the outstanding opportunity of obtaining two master's degrees from two different countries in Europe and ultimately put me on the path of beginning my Ph.D. For me as a foreign student, it was very exciting to work with diverse teaching staff representing different academic cultures from around the world and being able to study interesting and useful classes such as intelligence studies, US national security policy, etc. These courses became the foundation for my interest in pursuing a career in a particular area.
